IMPACTS OF THE 2021 SWAMP COOLER STUDY

With the help of local residents, a Grant from the Mojave Water Agency and expertise from the Mojave Desert Conservation Resource District, JBWD participated in a mighty effort to study and test the water use of varying swamp (evaporative) coolers in our area last year.

The results were eye-openers, with usage from a single swamp cooler using as much as 90 gallons of water per day when summer temps were in the tripple digits!

How does this impact us? With the state pushing for residents to reduce their indoor water use to as little as 55 gallons per person per day, some tough choices would have to be made regarding their water use, should such an ordinance go into effect.

This study *could* influence the state to give disadvantaged communities, such as ours, a varience for those who depend on swamp coolers to provided cooler temperatures during days of extreme heat.



MARCH 14-20 IS "FIX A LEAK WEEK"



WHY IS JOSHUA BASIN WATER DISTRICT "REDISTRICTING?"

The 2020 Census revealed that Joshua Tree's permanent residential population declined. Joshua Basin Water District is a community owned "District" and therefore, must be accurately "divided" to reflect its five-member elected Board representatives.

As mandated by the State of California (Election Code 2200 *et seq.)* "...the Board shall hold a public hearing to receive a presentation and public and Board comments relative to proposed Census data. The Board may identify its preferred map(s) and otherwise provide direction related to its proposed consideration of final maps at its March 16, 2022 meeting."



In otherwords, since JBWD customers no longer votes for the placement of all five Board Members (referred to as "at large" voting), the District must be divided into five geographical/demographical/ or likewise "divisions" that are nearly equal in population. Each divison votes on a Board member to represent their specific area, even though the elected representative thereafter is duty-bound to work on behalf of the entire District as a whole, once elected.

Drought Water Conservation Emergency Regulations as of January 2022

- Turn off decorative water fountains
- Turn off/pause your irrigation system when it's raining and for two days after rain
- Use an automatic shutoff nozzle on your water hose
- Use a broom, not water, to clean sidewalks and driveways
- Give trees just what they need: avoid overwatering

Q: Do I really need to call #811 --Dig Alert"? I'm only planting a flower bed.

A: Did you know that many utilities are buried just a few inches below ground? You can easily hit a line when digging for simple gardening projects, like planting flowers or small shrubs, putting in a mailbox post, or a fence. Contact your 811 center anytime you're putting a shovel in the ground to keep yourself and your community safe!

MARCH AT THE FARMERS' MARKET IN JOSHUA TREE:

Our State is in a drought--and increased water costs and rationing may be a reality in California's near future. Living in arid land, desert dwellers know the value of water. Native plant gardening is just another smart way to save every drop, plus it offers other great benefits:

- Obviously, saving water on your landscape can translate into water bill savings, as well.
- Native plants have adapted to our desert climate, so they won't struggle like non native plants just to survive (saving costs, as well as your time and energy for replacing plants year after year).
- Native plants generally don't require soil amendments (saving costs, energy and time).
- Native plants don't require toxic chemicals for pest infestations common with non native plants.
- Once established, native plants develop their own defense mechanisms against the local critters. While not always 100% fullproof, this acts as a natural deterrent and boasts of their survival mechanisms.

With COVID-19 restrictions relaxing, the District decided to redesign our existing lobby to meet the new Cal OSHA health and safety requirements--allowing us to resume "in person" customer service assistance sooner than later. The former remodeling plans (pre COVID-19)

DESERT-SMART GARDENING TIPS FOR MARCH

March Watering Schedule: 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM

Replace batteries in your irrigation clocks when Daylight Saving Time starts (March 13).

This month in your Desert-Smart Landscape:

Warm, mild weather this month prompts rapid growth of plants, as well as insect pests.

- Plant perennials as early as possible this month if you missed the fall planting season.
- Transplant Yuccas from March to mid-April.
- Teach your plants to grow deeply for moisture. In spring, for average soils, water deeply only every two to three weeks.
- Check aphids on new growth; wash off with strong jet of water (avoid chemicals).
- Get rid of weeds while they are small, especially before they reseed.




Plant Form: Perennial herb Water Use: Very low Mature Size: 2-4 ft. tall x 3-4 ft. wide

Exposure: Full sun

Bloom Time: Spring (March - May), Summer (June) Native to: Southern California, Central California, Baja California Hardiness: Cold Hardy to 0°F

Showy Penstemon knocks you out with its spectacular blue, purple, and pink flowers, while their wide-mouthed, tubular blossoms also attract butterflies, hummingbirds, bees, and other beneficial pollinators. The upper half of their leafy stems can produce up to 100 flowers—what's not to love? This fuss-free, fast-growing perennial herb is easy to grow and needs little to no added water once established. Cut back stems after early flowering, but allow later flowers to set seed for new plants. Water every 3-4 weeks or not at all after established. While it has no serious pests or disease issues, it is susceptible to root rot if kept in wet, poorly-drained soils. Showy Penstemon provides charm at the back of dry borders and beds either singly or in masses, in hummingbird and butterfly gardens, Mediterranean and cottage gardens, and in bold groupings.
